### \*\*\* Mayor's Musings \*\*\*

Things are happening around town. Five new houses are being built and may be almost finished by the time you read this. There was an article in the Signal a few weeks back that gave an overview of what is going on. Most of the article was accurate so you would be better off to read it than to believe all the rumors that are floating around.

The mayor's job still receives the same complaints, cats and dogs, the wind blowing trashcans around and the HIGH PRICE for water. If you remember last quarter's City Clips there was a lengthy discussion about the cost of providing low nitrate water and that our water rates are as low as most any in the state. When we talked about raising the water rates some were of the opinion that the more water you used the less per thousand should be charged. I didn't agree with this as this is an opportunity for those that use little water to save on their water bill and those that want to use a lot of water can pay the extra \$1.00 per 1,000 gallons from 2,001 gallons to 12,000 gallons, and \$1.25 per 1,000 gallons over 12,000 gallons to have as green a lawn as they like.

Along this same line, as required by the state, the council approved a Water Conservation Plan and passed Water Conservation Ordinance No. 351 (see page 9). The city is limited as to how much water we can pump, as are the farmers in the state. If a drought situation should occur, the ordinance allows for lawn watering restrictions culminating in fines and disconnection of water service. We hope it never gets to that point.

In the interim, we would like to see everyone practice voluntary water conservation such as telling your kids to not let the water run while they are brushing their teeth. (I know you never do that, but tell your kids.) Maybe you can think of other ways to save water (see page 12). Just remember that every bit of water you don't waste is money you save on your water bill.

When mowing grass, raking leaves, trimming bushes, please don't allow grass clippings, leaves, etc. to end up in the street. These items will find their way into the storm sewer and often cause clogs. Thank you for your help with this.

## Siren Testing

Kiowa County will be testing the storm sirens every Saturday at 12:30 p.m. for 30 seconds, except as follows:

- A Severe thunderstorm or tornado watch or warning is in effect at the time of the test, or has been in effect within six hours preceding the time of the test.
- Severe weather is forecast for any period up to 6:00 p.m. the day of the test.

The City has an agreement with Haviland State Bank so that you can authorize payment of your water/sewer/trash utility bill through a checking or savings account. "J" turns continue to be a problem on Main Street. There are double yellow lines and NO J TURN signs on the first and second blocks of north Main Street. These were added to keep people from making "J" turns in front of businesses, and also from making "J" turns when backing out of a parking space. Both turns are dangerous to traffic and pedestrians. With addition of the signs, you can be ticketed. Please use caution, obey the signs, and stop making "J" turns.

## Nisly Trash Service

Trash carts need to be set out by 7:00 a.m. each Wednesday, carts positioned with arrows on the lid facing the street.

**Recycling is the 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of each month.** These carts are collected later on that day, but should be out by 8:00 a.m. Again, position the cart so that the arrows on the lid are facing the street.

**If you have both trash and recycling, the carts need to be placed at least five feet apart, and not put next to a vehicle or any other obstacle. Do not leave emptied carts on the street.**

If your trash or recycling is not collected, please call or email the office as soon as possible. Leave a phone message if calling before 10:00 a.m.

**Trash will be collected on all holidays that occur on Wednesday with the exception of Christmas Day and New Year's Day.**

### Almond Chicken Salad

| 2 c. chicken, cooked and cubed     | ¼ t. salt                       |
| 1 c. celery, chopped               | 1 T. lemon juice                |
| 2 green onions, thinly sliced      | 1 c. sliced almonds             |
| 2 T. pimiento, drained and chopped | Lettuce leaves or fresh spinach |
| ¾ c. of salad dressing             |                                 |

Toss chicken, celery, onions, and pimiento together and chill. Mix salad dressing, salt and lemon juice together and chill. Before serving mix chicken mixture and dressing mixture together. Add sliced almonds last to keep them crisp. Serve on a bed of lettuce or fresh spinach. Serves 4 to 6.

### Home and Garden Hints and Tips

- Flower Display** – If your vase is too deep for your cut flowers, crush a paper towel and put in the bottom of the vase. This will also hold moisture.
- Baby Shampoo** – Baby shampoo is not only gentle for babies hair, but can also be used by adults for soft, shiny hair.
- Tinting Flowers** – Mix some food coloring in warm water and put flower stems in the solution. Stems will absorb the color and tint the flowers.
- Drying Clothes** – If your dryer seems to take longer to dry the clothes than it used to, remove the screen filter, scrub both sides with a soft brush in warm soapy water (an old toothbrush works well). Then rinse thoroughly and dry before putting back in dryer. This will also help your heating element last longer.
- Rabbit Plague** – Dust talcum powder around the base of your vegetable plants outside and it will quickly rid you of rabbit and flea beetle pests.
- Degreaser** – Keep a bottle of Dawn original blue dish detergent on hand, it's a great degreaser as well as a spot remover.
- Sowing Seeds** – Use a saltshaker to sow seeds in your garden. It will distribute the seeds more evenly.
- Odor Absorber** – To remove the smell of smoke, place bowls of white vinegar around the house to absorb the odor.
- Killing Weeds** – Pour boiling salt water on grass or weeds growing between sections of sidewalk.
- Onion Smell** – Remove onion smell from your hands by first washing them with soap and water. Then while hands are wet, rub them over the faucet spout.

# Nitrate Quarterly Report

## DRINKING WATER WARNING

### CITY OF HAVILAND Water Has High Levels of Nitrate

#### **DO NOT GIVE THE WATER TO INFANTS UNDER SIX MONTHS OLD OR USE IT TO MAKE INFANT FORMULA**

Water sample results collected 6/19/2012 from Well #1 showed nitrate levels of 13 mg/L (which is up from 12 last quarter), Well #2 showed nitrate levels of 13 mg/L (which is up from 12 last quarter), and Well #3 showed nitrate levels of 15 mg/L (which is the same as last quarter). This is above the federal nitrate standard or maximum contaminant level (MCL) of 10 mg/L. Nitrate in drinking water is a serious health concern for infants less than six months old.

#### **What should I do?**

- ❖ **DO NOT GIVE THE WATER TO INFANTS.** *Infants below the age of six months who drink water containing nitrate in excess of the MCL could become seriously ill and, if untreated, may die. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blue baby syndrome.* Blue baby syndrome is indicated by blueness of the skin. Symptoms in infants can develop rapidly, with health deteriorating over a period of days. If symptoms occur, seek medical attention immediately.
- ❖ Water, juice, and formula for children under six months of age should not be prepared with tap water. Bottled water or other water low in nitrates should be used for infants until further notice.
- ❖ **DO NOT BOIL THE WATER.** Boiling, freezing, filtering, or letting water stand does not reduce the nitrate level. Excessive boiling can make the nitrates more concentrated, because nitrates remain behind when the water evaporates.
- ❖ Adults and children older than six months can drink the tap water (nitrate is a concern for infants because they can't process nitrates in the same way adults can). However, if you are pregnant or have specific health concerns, you may wish to consult your doctor.

**What happened?** Nitrate in drinking water can come from natural, industrial, or agricultural sources (including septic systems and run-off). Levels of nitrate in drinking water can vary throughout the year. We'll let you know when the amount of nitrate is again below the limit.

**What is being done?** Oscar Ebert has been installing reverse osmosis systems in homes and continues to do so. These are being installed at no cost to you. If you want an icemaker added to the system, Oscar will charge you for this. Please call the City Office to get your name on the schedule. Homes with infants under six months of age, women that are pregnant or nursing, and those with doctor-approved medical conditions will have first priority. If you have not called, you will be added to the schedule in the order that meters are read, west to east.

The council is aware that many of you already have a system in your home. The City will be putting systems in your homes also. Please call the office, 862-5317, or email [cityhall@havilandtelco.com](mailto:cityhall@havilandtelco.com) to let us know if you have a system. If you have a lease agreement with a provider, contact them about discontinuing that service. Since you have systems, you will be placed last in the scheduling.

## Publishing of Ordinances and Resolutions

We are required to publish all new ordinances and resolutions in the City's designated newspaper, which is the Kiowa County Signal. Many of you do not take the paper, so with the quarterly newsletter, we now have another way to publish these items.

### ORDINANCE NO. 350

#### AN ORDINANCE ANNEXING LAND TO THE CITY OF HAVILAND, KANSAS.

**WHEREAS**, the following described land adjoins the City of Haviland, Kansas; and,

**WHEREAS**, a consent for annexation of the following described land, signed by all of the owners thereof, has been filed with the City of Haviland, Kansas pursuant to K.S.A. 12-520, as amended; and,

**WHEREAS**, the governing body of the City of Haviland, Kansas, finds it advisable to annex such land.

#### NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HAVILAND, KANSAS:

**SECTION 1. PROPERTY ANNEXED.** That the described land is hereby annexed and made a part of the city of Haviland, Kansas:

A tract of land in the Northwest Quarter (NW1/4) of Section Eight (8), Township Twenty-eight (28) South, Range Sixteen (16) West of the Sixth Principal Meridian, Kiowa County, Kansas, more particularly described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the Southwest corner of said Northwest Quarter of Section 8 thence S89°17'50"E a distance of 1033.14 feet (record 1033.00') along the South line of said Northwest Quarter of Section 8; thence N00°37'11"E a distance of 264.15 feet (record 264.00'); thence S89°14'17"E a distance of 145.38 feet (record 145.00') to a Point of Beginning; thence N00°42'02"E a distance of 52.05 feet; thence S89°17'51"E a distance of 225 feet; thence S00°42'02"W a distance of 51.97 feet; thence N89°18'00"W a distance of 225.00 feet; to the Point of Beginning, containing 0.269 acres, more or less; and

A tract of land in the Northwest Quarter (NW ¼) of Section Eight (8), Township Twenty-Eight (28) South, Range Sixteen (16) West of the Sixth Principal Meridian, Kiowa County, Kansas, more particularly described as follows, to-wit: Commencing at the Southeast corner of said Northwest Quarter of Section 8 thence N89°18'00"W a distance of 1454.61 feet along the South line of said Northwest Quarter of Section 8; thence N00°42'10"E a distance of 30.00 feet to the North line of Sycamore Street and a Point of Beginning; thence continuing N00°42'10"E a distance of 234.01 feet; thence S89°18'00"E a distance of 225.00 feet; thence S00°42'10"W a distance of 234.01 feet to the North line of Sycamore Street; thence N89°18'00"W a distance of 225.00 feet to the Point of Beginning, containing 1.209 acres, more or less.

**SECTION 2. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the official City newspaper, The Kiowa County Signal as provided by law.

Passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor the 4th day of June 2012.

### ORDINANCE NO. 351

#### AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE DECLARATION OF ONE OF THREE PROGRESSIVE STAGES OF A WATER SUPPLY CONSERVATION AND/OR WATER SUPPLY SHORTAGE WHICH SHALL CONSERVE OR CURTAIL THE USE OF WATER WITHIN THE CITY OF HAVILAND, KANSAS; ESTABLISHING THREE STAGES OF WATER CONSERVATION MEASURES FOR THE CITY; A WATER WATCH, WARNING OR EMERGENCY; ESTABLISHING PROCEDURES AND VOLUNTARY AND MANDATORY CONSERVATION MEASURES; AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF ADMINISTRATIVE REGULATIONS; AND PRESCRIBING CERTAIN PENALTIES.

#### NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF HAVILAND, KANSAS.

**SECTION 1. PURPOSE.** The purpose of this ordinance is to provide for a progressive water supply conservation program, including the declaration of a water supply watch, warning or emergency and the implementation of voluntary and mandatory water conservation measures throughout the City in the event such a watch, warning or emergency is declared by the governing body of the City.

#### **SECTION 2. DEFINITIONS**

- (a) "Water", as used in this ordinance, shall mean water available to the City of Haviland for treatment by virtue of the City's water rights, water supply, water supply contracts or any treated water introduced by the City into its water distribution system, including water offered for sale at any coin-operated site.
- (b) "Customer", as used in this ordinance, shall mean the customer of record using either water for any purpose from the City's water distribution system and for which either a regular charge is made or, in the case of coin sales, a cash charge is made at the site of delivery.
- (c) "Waste of water", as used in this ordinance, includes, but is not limited to:
  - (1) permitting water to escape down a street, roadway or other surface intended for vehicle driving purposes, and/or any gutter, ditch, or other surface drain; or
  - (2) failure to repair a controllable leak of water due to defective plumbing.
- (d) The following classes of uses of water are established for the purposes of this ordinance:
  - (1) Class 1: Water used for outdoor watering; either public or private, for gardens,

- lawns, trees, shrubs, plants, parks, golf courses, playing fields, swimming pools or other recreational areas; or the washing of motor vehicles, boats, trailers, or the exterior of any building or structure.
- (2) Class 2: Water used for any commercial, agricultural or industrial purposes, except water actually necessary to maintain the health and personal hygiene of bona fide employees of such businesses or interests while such employees are engaged in the performance of their duties at their place of employment.
  - (3) Class 3: Domestic usage, other than that which would be included in either Classes 1 or 2.
  - (4) Class 4: Water necessary only to sustain human life and the lives of domestic livestock pets and maintain standards of hygiene and sanitation.

**SECTION 3. WATER CONSERVATION STAGES.** In the event that the governing body of the City or the City's designated official determines that the City's water supply may be in subject to a shortage in supply or the governing body of the City determines there is need for conservation of City's water resources for any reason, the City may begin the progressive three (3) stage water conservation program by declaring a water watch as described in section 3(a) or, in times of need and/or duress, the governing body of the City may choose to declare any section of the program described in section 3 in effect at any time:

- (a) **Stage 1: Declaration of Water Watch.** Whenever the governing body of the City finds that conditions indicate that the probability of a drought or some other condition causing a major water supply shortage is rising, it shall be empowered to declare, by resolution, that a water watch exists and that it shall take steps to inform the public and ask for voluntary reductions in water use. Such a watch shall be deemed to continue until it is declared by resolution of the governing body to have ended. The resolutions declaring the existence and end of a water watch shall be effective upon their publication in the official city newspaper.
- (b) **Stage 2: Declaration of Water Warning.** Whenever the governing body of the City finds that drought conditions or some other condition causing a major water supply shortage are present and supplies are starting to decline, it shall be empowered to declare by resolution that a water warning exists and that it will recommend restrictions on nonessential uses during the period of warning. Such a warning shall be deemed to continue until it is declared by resolution of the governing body to have ended. The resolutions declaring the beginning and ending of the water warning shall be effective upon their publication in the official city newspaper.
- (c) **Stage 3: Declaration of Water Emergency.** Whenever the governing body of the City finds that an emergency exists by reason of a shortage of water supply needed for essential uses, it shall be empowered to declare by resolution that a water supply emergency exists and that it will impose mandatory restrictions on water use during the period of the emergency. Such an emergency shall be deemed to continue until it is declared by resolution of the governing body to have ended. The resolutions declaring the existence and end of a water supply emergency shall be effective upon their publication in the official city newspaper.

**SECTION 4. VOLUNTARY CONSERVATION MEASURES.** Upon the declaration of a water watch or water warning as provided in Sections 3(a) or 3(b), the mayor is authorized to call on all water consumers to employ voluntary water conservation measures to limit or eliminate nonessential water uses including, but not limited to, limitations on the following uses:

- (a) Class 1 uses of water.
- (b) Waste of water.

**SECTION 5. MANDATORY CONSERVATION MEASURES.** Upon the declaration of a water supply emergency as provided in Section 3(c), the mayor is also authorized to implement certain mandatory water conservation measures, including, but not limited to, the following conservation measures:

- (a) Suspension of new connections to the City's water distribution system, except connections of fire hydrants and those made pursuant to agreements entered into by the City prior to the effective date of the declaration of the emergency;
- (b) Restrictions on the uses of water in one or more classes of water use as described in section 2(d), wholly or in part;
- (c) Restrictions on the sales of water at coin-operated facilities or sites;
- (d) The imposition of water rationing based on any reasonable formula including, but not limited to, the percentage of normal use and per capita or per consumer restrictions;
- (e) Complete or partial bans on the waste of water; and
- (f) Any combination of the measures in sections 5(a-e) as the governing body of the City or authorized City official may deem appropriate and/or necessary.

**SECTION 6. EMERGENCY WATER RATES.** Upon the declaration of a water supply emergency as provided in Section 3(c), the governing body of the City shall have the power to adopt emergency water rates by ordinance designed to conserve water supplies. Such emergency rates may provide for, but are not limited to:

- (a) Higher charges for increasing usage per unit of use (increasing block rates);
- (b) Uniform charges for water usage per unit of use (uniform unit rate); or
- (c) Extra charges in excess of a specified level of water use (excess demand surcharge).

**SECTION 7. REGULATIONS.** During the effective period of any water supply emergency as provided for in Section 3(c), the mayor is empowered to promulgate such regulations as may be necessary to carry out the provisions of this ordinance, any water supply emergency resolution, or emergency water rate ordinance. Such regulations shall be subject to the approval of the governing body at its next regular or special meeting.

**SECTION 8. VIOLATIONS, DISCONNECTIONS AND PENALTIES.**

- (a) If the mayor charged with implementation and enforcement of this ordinance or a water supply emergency resolution learns of any violation of any water use restrictions imposed pursuant to Sections 5 or 7 of this ordinance, a written notice of the violation shall be affixed to the property where the violation occurred and the customer of record and/or any other person known to the City to be responsible for the violation and/or the correction of said violation shall be provided with either actual or mailed notice. Said notice shall describe the violation(s) and order that the noted violation(s) be corrected, cured or abated immediately or within such specified time as the City determines is reasonable for such correction, cure or abatement under the circumstances. In the event the order is not cured within the time period given in the notice, the city may terminate water service to the customer subject to the following procedures:
  - (1) The City shall give the customer notice by mail or actual notice that water service will be discontinued within a specified time due to the violation(s) and that the customer will have the opportunity to appeal the termination by hearing scheduled before the City governing body or a City official designated as a hearing officer by the City governing body;
  - (2) If such a hearing is requested by the customer charged with the violation, the customer shall be given a full opportunity to be heard by the City governing body or the City official designated as a hearing officer by the City governing body before termination is ordered; and
  - (3) The City governing body or the City official designated as a hearing officer by the City governing body shall make findings of fact and order whether service should continue or be terminated.
- (b) A fee of \$50.00 shall be paid for the reconnection of any water service terminated pursuant to subsection (a). In the event of subsequent violations, the reconnection fee shall be \$75.00 for the second reconnection and \$100.00 for any subsequent additional reconnections within a one year period.
- (c) Violations of this ordinance shall be a municipal offense and may be prosecuted in Municipal Court. Any person so charged and found guilty in Municipal court of violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of a municipal offense. Each calendar day in which a violation is observed shall constitute a separate offense. The penalty for an initial violation shall be a mandatory fine of \$50.00. In addition, such customer may be required by the Court to serve a definite term of confinement in the county jail which shall be fixed by the Court and which shall not exceed two (2) days. The penalty for a second or subsequent conviction shall be a mandatory fine of \$100.00. In addition, such customer shall serve a definite term of confinement in the county jail which shall be fixed by the Court and which shall not exceed ten (10) days.

**SECTION 9. EMERGENCY TERMINATION.** Nothing in this ordinance shall limit the ability of any properly authorized City official from terminating the supply of water to any or all customers upon the determination of such City official that emergency termination of water service is required to protect the health and safety of the public or for any other emergency as required or authorized by ordinance or as deemed a necessity of the city by such city official or the governing body of the City.

**SECTION 10. SEVERABILITY.** If any provision of this ordinance is declared unconstitutional, or the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held invalid, the constitutionality of the remainder of the ordinance and its applicability to other persons and circumstances shall not be affected thereby.

**SECTION 11. EFFECTIVE DATE.** This ordinance shall become effective upon its publication in the official city newspaper, The Kiowa County Signal.

Passed by the council and approved by the mayor this 4th day of June, 2012.

## Ways to Conserve Water

- When washing dishes by hand, don't let the water run while rinsing. Fill one sink with wash water and the other with rinse water.
- Some refrigerators, air conditioners and icemakers are cooled with wasted flows of water. Consider upgrading with air-cooled appliances for significant water savings.
- Adjust sprinklers so only your lawn is watered and not the house, sidewalk, or street.
- Run your clothes washer and dishwasher only when they are full. You can save up to 1,000 gallons a month.
- Choose shrubs and groundcovers instead of turf for hard-to-water areas such as steep slopes and isolated strips.
- Install covers on pools and spas and check for leaks around your pumps.
- Use the garbage disposal sparingly. Compost vegetable food waste instead and save gallons every time.
- Plant in the fall when conditions are cooler and rainfall is more plentiful.
- For cold drinks, keep a pitcher of water in the refrigerator instead of running the tap. This way, every drop goes down you and not the drain.
- Spreading a layer of organic mulch around plants retains moisture and saves water, time and money.
- Monitor your water bill for unusually high use. Your bill and water meter are tools that can help you discover leaks.
- Water your lawn and garden in the morning or evening when temperatures are cooler to minimize evaporation.
- Wash your fruits and vegetables in a pan of water instead of running water from the tap.
- Use a broom instead of a hose to clean your driveway and sidewalk and save water every time.
- If your shower fills a one-gallon bucket in less than 20 seconds, replace the showerhead with a water-efficient model.
- Collect the water you use for rinsing fruits and vegetables, then reuse it to water houseplants.
- If water runs off your lawn easily, split your watering time into shorter periods to allow for better absorption.
- We're more likely to notice leaks indoors, but don't forget to check outdoor faucets, sprinklers and hoses for leaks.
- If you have an automatic refilling device, check your pool periodically for leaks.
- Check the root zone of your lawn or garden for moisture before watering using a spade or trowel. If it's still moist two inches under the soil surface, you still have enough water.
- When buying new appliances, consider those that offer cycle and load size adjustments. They're more water and energy efficient.
- Shorten your shower by a minute or two and you'll save up to 150 gallons per month.
- Upgrade older toilets with water efficient models.
- Adjust your lawn mower to a higher setting. A taller lawn shades roots and holds soil moisture better than if it is closely clipped.

## National Do Not Call Registry

The National Do Not call Registry gives you a choice about whether to receive telemarketing calls at home or on your cell phone. To register by phone, call (1-888-382-1222). You can register only one phone number each time you call the National Do Not Call Registry, and you must call from the phone number you wish to register. To register on line, go to [www.donotcall.gov](http://www.donotcall.gov), click on "Register a Phone Number" in the left column. You can register up to three telephone numbers at one time on the website. This is a free service. After you register, your phone number(s) will show up on the Registry by the next day. Telemarketers have up to 31 days to get your phone number and remove it from their call lists.

**Your registration will not expire.** Telephone numbers placed on the National Do Not Call Registry will remain on it permanently due to the Do-Not-Call Improvement Act of 2007, which became law in February 2008. You can read more about it at <http://www.ftc.gov/opa/2008/04/dncfyi.shtm>. Telephone numbers on the Registry will only be removed when they are disconnected and reassigned, or when the consumer chooses to remove a number from the Registry.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC), the nation's consumer protection agency, manages the National Do Not Call Registry. The FTC, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), and state law enforcement officials enforce it.

**Scammers have been making phone calls claiming to represent the National Do Not Call Registry. The calls claim to provide an opportunity to sign up for the Registry. These calls are not coming from the Registry or the Federal Trade Commission, and you should not respond to these calls.**

The National Do Not Call Registry is only for personal phone numbers. The National Do Not Call Registry does not cover business-to-business calls and faxes.

**You may have received an email telling you that your cell phone is about to be assaulted by telemarketing calls as a result of a new cell phone number database; however, that is not the case. FCC regulations prohibit telemarketers from using automated dialers to call cell phone numbers. Automated dialers are standard in the industry, so most telemarketers don't call consumers on their cell phones without their consent.**

If your number(s) has been on the National Do Not Call Registry for at least 31 days and you receive a call from a telemarketer that you believe is covered by the National Do Not Call Registry, you can file a complaint at the Registry's website at [www.donotcall.gov](http://www.donotcall.gov), click on "File a Complaint" in the left column, or by calling the Registry's toll-free number at 1-888-382-1222. You must provide the date that the company called you and the number that was called and respond to a question asking if the call was a prerecorded message.


